Trainings and Workshops

XXXI P.G. Diploma in Wildlife Management Course concluded

The Course commenced on September 1, 2009 for duration of nine months with a total of 11 participating officer trainees of

the rank of DCFs/ACFs and equivalent ranks from different States within India and from abroad. A 2-month Modular Training Course on `Integrated Wildlife Management Planning' (April 1, to May 31,

2010) was organised for lateral entrants. Management Planning exercise tour was conducted at Kanha Tiger Reserve. The trainees were exposed to the field situation and management challenges at the Tiger Reserve. One lateral entrant from Madhya Pradesh joined this module. The trainees were exposed to various facets of the Park including its past management history and conservation strategies. The trainees were taken to the Buffer zone and the forest patches connecting Kanha with Phen Sanctuary and Achanakmar to the east as well as the Pench Tiger Reserve to the west. They also visited Pench Tiger Reserve.

The Valedictory Function was held on May 31, 2010. Shri A.S. Negi, Former Chief Wildlife Warden, Uttarakhand was the Chief Guest on this occasion. He presented the awards and prizes to the officer trainees. Officer trainees were awarded the P.G. Diploma in Wildlife Management on their successful completion of the course. 30th Annual Symposium on Sea Turtle Biology and Conservation, Goa, *April 24-30, 2010.* The symposium was held at the famous Kala Academy located on the banks of the River Mandovi in Panaji. It was for the first time that the symposium was held in the South Asia region. Nearly 400 people from across the globe attended the symposium and included more than 100 talks and 250 poster presentations.

The Wildlife Institute of India had a major presence at the symposium and a stall was put up where the Institute's two decades of sea turtle research were displayed. Shri B.C. Choudhury gave the introductory talk at the South Asia Mini Symposium. During the course of the symposium five oral and three poster presentations on WII's sea turtle research activities dealing with different aspects were made. Shri Satya Ranjan Behera, SRF was given the Archie

Second Meeting of the GBIF India Nodes, Dehradun, May 3, 2010. The second meeting of the Indian Nodes of Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) was held in the Institute under the chairmanship of Shri A.K. Goyal, Joint Secretary, MoEF. Thirteen participants from seven organisations participated in the meeting. The Chairman informed that the MoEF has designated five nodes for dealing with all matters relating to development of bioinformatics in India. Dr. V.B. Mathur, Dean, Faculty of Wildlife Sciences stated that data management is a mandate of every organisation. GBIF Workshop on Biodiversity Data Discovery and Publishing, Dehradun, *May*4-7, 2010. Global Biodiversity Information
Facility (GBIF) was established in March
2001, as an open ended international
coordinating body to promote compilation,
linking, standardization, digitization and
dissemination of world's biodiversity data
in the form of distributed open access
system, within an appropriate framework
for property rights and due attribution.
Wildlife Institute of India has been
designated as the Coordinating Agency for
GBIF activities in India. The workshop is

the first of the series of workshops to be held in collaboration with GBIF. The resource persons Dr. Vishwas, Ms Mélianie, Mr. Kyle and Mr. Sood from GBIF Secretariat in Copenhagen, Denmark came to deliver lectures. Thirty two participants from 10 different national and international institutions participated in the workshop. The workshop focused on the following: (i) Developing institutional data discovery and mobilisation strategy; (ii) Digitisation of primary biodiversity data; (iii) Biodiversity Data Standards and Protocols; (iv) Introduction to GBIF-IPT; (v) IPT and publishing of biodiversity data; (vi) IPT requirements and base technologies; (vii) IPT customisation, expansion and internationalisation; (viii) demonstration; (ix) Introduction to Darwin Core; and (x) Addressing social, political and intellectual property barriers inhibiting data discovery and mobilisation followed by hands on practical session. GBIF-Asian Nodes Regional Meeting and Biodiversity Informatics Workshop, Dehradun, June 28-30, 2010. The Global Biodiversity Information Facility Secretariat (GBIFs) in collaboration with the Wildlife Institute (WII) of India organized the Regional Meeting and Biodiversity Informatics Workshop. The meeting was chaired by Mr. Pando Francisco (GBIF NODES Chair).



Representatives from University of Tokyo (Japan), Korea Institute of Science and Technology Information (South Korea), Wildlife Institute of India (India), Asian Centre for Biodiversity (Philippines), Biodiversity Research Center (Chinese ICIMOD (Nepal) Taipei), BioNet?EASIANET (Mongolia) participated in the meeting. The GBIF secretariat was represented by Mr. Juan Bello and Dr. Vishwas Chavan. The participants discussed the following: (i) Regional priorities and targets; (ii) Requirements / opportunities for the implementation of the Regional Action Plan; (iii) Mechanisms to improve the regional coordination, communication, collaboration, and participation; (iv) Suggestions on how to streamline the structure and functioning the Nodes Committee; Recommendations on how to advance the implementation and uptake of the GBIF Work Programme within each region; (vi) Regional, national, or thematic priorities for the 2011 Work Programme; and (vii) Regional, national, or thematic priorities for the 2012-2017 Strategic Plans. *Contact: gautam@wii.gov.in*

Consultative Meeting for Nandadevi-Landscape **Biodiversity Conservation and Livelihood Security for** Local Community, Dehradun, June 2, 2010. The meeting was jointly organised by Wildlife Institute of India & Kalpavriksh using WII's Grant-in-aid funds. The objectives of the Consultative Meeting were to: (i) understand the conservation importance of Nandadevi-Askot Landscape; (ii) discuss the issues concerning conservation of natural resources and livelihood security of the local people in the region; and (iii) decide on various steps required for development of an integrated strategy for long-term conservation of this landscape by involving different stakeholders and communities and through their better coordination.

The consultative meeting was organized as a part of series of dialogues by Wildlife Institute of India and Kalpvriksh. In this meeting, representatives of major stakeholders in this landscape participated. After brief introductory presentations on Nanda Devi Biosphere Reserve and Askot Wildlife Sanctuary, the participants discussed major issues concerning the long-term conservation of this landscape. They also discussed on issues related to the livelihoods of local communities and

National Consultation Workshop for Identification of Research Gaps in Coastal and Marine Biodiversity Conservation in India, Chennai, June 24-25, 2010. Wildlife Institute of India in association with the Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF) organized this two-day National Consultation Workshop. The main objective of workshop was to identify the gap areas in research so that steps could be initiated to conduct important research programmes on a priority basis, which would strengthen the conservation and management of coastal and marine biodiversity in the country.

The workshop was inaugurated by Dr (Mrs.) Aruna Basu Sarkar, Director, Gulf of Mannar Biosphere Trust, Tamil Nadu. Forty delegates including Scientists, Field managers and Researchers from various organizations participated in the workshop. The leading professionals from various organizations addressed the review of work done in different aspects of coastal and marine biodiversity research. They also highlighted the important gap areas in the concerned field. Six groups were formed for the following thrust areas and gap areas: (a) Landscape/Seascape/Ecosystem level research; (b) Habitat level research on Coastal and Marine Biodiversity; (c) Species level research on Coastal and Marine Biodiversity; (d) Development of Technology for Coastal and Marine

Biodiversity Research; (e) Monitoring & Restoration Ecology; and (f) Socioeconomic and Policy-level Research. *Contact: ksivakumar@wii.gov.in*

Training Workshop on Strengthening CITES Implementation Capacity, Makati City, **Philippines,** *June 15-17, 2010.* The objective of the workshop was to ensure sustainable wildlife management and nondetrimental trade. The workshop was jointly organized by CITES (the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora) Secretariat and the Protected Areas and Wildlife Bureau, Philippines. The participants learnt the basic understanding of the obligations under the Convention and its procedures. This workshop also offered an introduction to Non-Detriment Finding (NDF). A non-detriment finding for the purpose of import must be made by the Scientific Authority of the State of Import for import of Appendix I-listed species.
